

## **Fremont Officers Travel to Dallas, Texas**



Fremont Officers Kevin Kolk and Curtis Franks recently drove to Texas to attend funerals for the Dallas Police Officers killed in the July 7th sniper attack. Kolk and Franks are members of the Newaygo County Honor Guard and felt very strongly that this is something they had to do. Kolk and Franks set out on the journey paying all of their own expenses and taking vacation time to do this. When word got out about what they were doing, donations came in and nearly covered all of their expenses. Upon their return both Officers expressed how this revitalized them and made them focus on what is important. The City is proud to have officers with fortitude and commitment to their profession. The leading cause of Officer deaths this year are firearms related fatalities. Fatal firearm related attacks on officers are up 78 percent from 2015.

## Fremont Community Joint Planning Commissions “Master Plan” Update

The Fremont Community Joint Planning Commission (FCJPC), representing the City of Fremont, Sheridan Charter Township and Dayton Township, in a joint effort provides planning and zoning regulation services for the Fremont Community. Recently it completed an update of the Community’s Master Plan. The Master Plan, also known as the Fremont Community Joint Comprehensive and Growth Management Plan, is a long-range policy plan for land use that helps guide officials when making development decisions. Updates made to the plan include text, land use, charts, tables, graphs, illustrations and maps that describe the Joint Planning Commission’s proposal for the long-range development of the community. ### Fremont Lake Water Quality Study & Invasive Weed Treatment Program

The City of Fremont and Sheridan Charter Township have teamed up with MSU to conduct a water quality and invasive weed study on Fremont Lake and its streams this summer (May – September.) Throughout the process they have already conducted two workshop presentations educating residents on Fremont Lake’s ecosystem, the watershed and the role of both native and invasive species.

Since the last lake study in 2009, the City and Township have jointly coordinated an invasive weed treatment program over the last four summers, attempting to control Eurasian milfoil, which had taken over a large portion of the lake that was impeding watercraft traffic. While acknowledging the need to control this invasive species, the City

also understands the need for aquatic plant life in maintaining a healthy eco-system in the lake. Attempting to maintain an adequate balance of plant life for a lake healthy is not easy, whereas the milfoil is aggressive and chemical treatment of it affects the native plant life as well.

**MSU’s final education session is scheduled for October 6th, from 7:00-8:30 PM at the Sheridan Twp. Hall, 6360 S. Township Pkwy, off 60th Street.** Residents, boaters, fishermen, campers are all invited to attend the final session, which will include a review of MSU’s findings and recommendations based on the 2016 data and results and past four season treatments. The cost of this project was shared equally by the City of Fremont & Sheridan Charter Twp.

## Downtown Fremont Receives Eight (8) New Rental Apartments!

Working together, the City of Fremont, DDA and Newaygo County Brownfield Authority, helped coordinate another successful Fremont Downtown Rental Rehabilitation Program. The purpose of the program is to partner with owners of downtown properties to create quality, affordable housing in commercial buildings and to stimulate economic activity in the City. The recently completed program created a total of eight new rental units within the upper levels of buildings of Downtown, five of which are income based. All eight of the units were immediately filled and occupied by tenants.



Special thanks to building owners Merle Ross (2 E. Main St.), Paul Mellema (10 S. Division Ave.), and Jud Afman (26 E. Main St.) for their significant investment in their downtown buildings and commitment to the community to provide affordable housing.

## Take Pride in Your Curbside!

The City sweeps the streets every spring and fall, but weeds begin to creep up in the cracks by mid-summer. The City does not spray for weeds along the curbs in late summer, so residents are asked to help maintain areas where curbsides and sidewalks become overgrown.

Our Deadhead Committee, a group of citizens that volunteer their time to de-weed downtown flowerbeds and parking lots, encourage residents to “take pride in your curbside!” Weeds are commonly removed by weed-killer products, pulled while the soil is damp or by a weed-whip. Residents and their lawn-care providers should blow cut grass back onto the lawn while mowing or with a blower to avoid grass and weed seedlings from filling the seams in the curbing and sidewalks.

A lot of time and energy is spent by residents keeping their yard and surrounding area tidy and pleasant, so we encourage everyone to join them in their efforts and take pride.



# Voter ID Reminder

Voters will be asked to provide identification when they visit the polls on Election Day. They will be asked to present a valid photo ID, such as a Michigan driver's license, federal or state government issued photo I.D., passport, military identification card, student identification or tribal identification card.

Anyone who does not have an acceptable form of photo ID or failed to bring it with them to the polls may still be able to vote. They will be required to sign a brief affidavit stating that they're not in possession of photo ID. Their ballots will be included with all others and counted on Election Day.

Members of the Dead Heads noticed there were weeds in the flower beds in the downtown area, cigarette butts on the sidewalks and in parking lots, and dead flower heads in the pots. So they formed a committee of volunteers to help keep downtown looking attractive and the City placed cigarette butt urns in heavy smoking areas downtown to encourage smokers to keep trash off the ground.

The City reminds motorists that there is no parking of any motor vehicle upon any public street or alley within the City limits between the hours of 2 AM and 6 AM at any time from December 1st thru April 1st. Your cooperation would be greatly appreciated.



## Refuse/Recycling Changes



During the first two weeks of January and July each year, property owner may elect to change refuse pick-up service from a roll-out cart to mixed-refuse bags or vice-versa by notifying the City Offices. Please note that changes are only allowed during these two-week periods.

City residents are reminded that, per City Code, election signs are not to be placed in the City street rights-of-way. They may not be placed, nailed or affixed to any tree, utility pole, light, sign or lamp post or other object within the area between the curb & sidewalk along all City streets. Non-conforming signs will be removed without notice or compensation.

The Newaygo County Clerk's Office will again provide election results through the Internet site at [www.electionmagic.com](http://www.electionmagic.com). Current election results as they are reported to the County Clerk's Office will be posted on election night. Upcoming 2016 election dates to remember:

- October 11:** Last day to register for voting eligibility for the November 8th Presidential Election
- November 8:** Presidential Election, 101 E. Main Street, Fremont. Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m.

As a convenience to our City voters, if you or your spouse would like to be added to the City's permanent absentee voter (AV) list, please notify the City Offices at 924-2101. Those on the list are mailed an AV application before each election as a reminder and given the option to vote absentee or in person. Please exercise your right to vote at all elections. We should all live by the adage that "If you don't vote, you don't have the right to complain!" ★

## 2016 Construction Season Nears End

Every year, the City strives to maintain and improve its streets and water/sewer utility systems. During that time, residents and drivers experience inconvenient detours and construction noise, but the results of every project are always worthwhile. We thank residents for their patience!

During the past Spring and Summer of 2016 construction season, the following street & utility system improvements were completed:

- Fremont Street – Reconstructed the street while replacing the water main and lined the sanitary sewer main
- Main Street – Installed a right-turn lane on East Main Street approaching Stewart Avenue from the west

Remaining projects expected to be completed this summer and start next spring:

- Merchant Avenue – Mill and resurface between Pine Street and Sheridan Street
- Darling Avenue – Mill and resurface between Maple Street and Pine Street
- Cedar Street – Construct new street extension from Gerber Avenue to Stone Road (2017)

# Winter 2016 Property Tax Payment Schedule

Winter taxes will be mailed on Wednesday, November 30, 2016 and due by Tuesday, February 14, 2017. A 4% penalty is added to any unpaid tax bills. Winter taxes include millage rates for Newaygo County, Intermediate School District, Fremont Area District Library and on occasion, a County Drain.

The City accepts tax payments until Tuesday, February 28, 2017; on March 1, 2017 all payments must be paid to the Newaygo County Treasurer's Office at PO Box 885, White Cloud, MI 49349.

## BRUSH CHIPPING IS COMING TO AN END

The City continues to remove brush without charge, the first Monday of each month April through October. The last brush pick up for the 2016 season will be the first Monday in October (10/3). Brush must be stacked with the cut end at curbside with limbs no more than three inches (3") in diameter. The City will not remove remaining tree-top brush from a tree removed by either the owner or a private tree removal company. The program is intended for routine tree/bush trimming and fallen branches. Residents throughout the City must have their brush placed curbside by 7:30 a.m. of each first Monday morning. Brush is not to be placed at curbside any earlier than the Friday before the first Monday. The City will also continue to provide curbside chipping of Christmas trees the first two weeks of January.


